

MINISTRY DAYS & **GENERAL ASSEMBLY** IN SPOKANE

Welcome to Spokane, ancestral homelands of the Spokan or Spokane Native American peoples who inhabited the areas of Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho. The Spokane language is a part of the Salishan language family that was spoken throughout the Pacific Northwest.

The current Spokane Indian Reservation is located in northeastern Washington, centered at Wellpinit about an hour from here. We honor this place and continuously seek to acknowledge that we minister and live on stolen lands, and ask for permission and forgiveness as we strive to be in authentic relationships.

DRUUMM has worked for a generation in calling for the UUA and UUMA to be mindful of our place and to work for reconciliation and healing as part of our Journey Towards Wholeness for anti-racism, anti-oppression and multiculturalism. Rev. Dr. Bill Sinkford, former UUA President and a founding member of DRUUMM offered to the Ute people at our GA in Salt Lake City, "What I believe is that reconciliation begins with truth-telling, with knowing and telling the stories. Reconciliation begins with confession on both sides. And so, to the Ute people, the Unitarian

Universalist Association of Congregations offers our heartfelt apology. We participated, however ineptly, in the process that stole your land and forced a foreign way of life on you...We ask for your forgiveness and we promise to stand with you as you chart your way forward."

There will be amazing opportunities throughout this week in Spokane to connect with UU People of Color. We will be leading worship, the business plenaries, hosting workshops and facilitating small group meetings. We hope you will connect with DRUUMM, drop by our booth, join or renew your membership for 2019-2020.

EMBRACING THE CRACKS AND THE GOLD

The Rev. Leslie Takahashi, former DRUUMM President and Lead Minister of the Mt Diablo UU Church



in Walnut Creek CA is this years esteemed Berry Street keynote speaker. On Wednesday June 19th at 2:00pm in the Davenport Grand, she will deliver her address "Truth, Trauma and Transformation: Embracing the Cracks and the Gold" before the members of the UU Ministers Association and guests. Rev. Sofia Betancourt will deliver the response. Rev. Takahashi who is bi-racial Japanese American, came into Unitarian Universalism as a young adult in North Carolina and credits the faith with saving her life. Unitarianism was her family religion on her mother's side and she was raised unchurched. She is the co-author, with Rev, Chip Rouch and Dr. Leon Spencer of The Arc of the Universe is Long: Race and the UUA, published by Skinner House, a comprehensive overview of our denomination's anti-racism and anti-oppression efforts since the 1990s.

Rev. Takahashi is also currently Chair of the Commission on Institutional Change and on the faculty of Meadville Lombard Theological School where she is also a graduate. She is the grateful parent of Garner Takahashi Morris and Liam Takahashi and mother to canine trauma-survivors Crystal and Ferdinand.
